

## Tokyo ICCE Research Fair – 2019

The ICCE Research Fair is scheduled for October 28-29, 2019 prior to the ICCE Global Coaching Conference (30<sup>th</sup> October to 1<sup>st</sup> November, 2019) in Tokyo, Japan. When you register for the ICCE Global Coach Conference you will indicate your interest in the Research fair, which will incur a small additional cost. The Tokyo conference theme is *Coaching – The Cornerstone of Education, Equity, Ethics and Excellence in Sport*.

The Co-Chairs of the ICCE Research Committee, introduced the Research Fair at the 2013 Durban (South Africa) ICCE Global Coach Conference to encourage greater interaction between researchers. An important aim of the Research Committee of ICCE is to develop an internationally collaborative research community to promote sharing of knowledge and understanding to develop research capability that, in turn, will inform both policy and practice in advancing the professionalisation of sports coaching and the sporting experience for all actors. This will be our fourth Research Fair and we have received very positive feedback from the three previous events about the importance of this event to advance research and scholarship in sports coaching across the globe. We cordially invite researchers, academics, coach developers, coaches, and officials to join us in building our community and advancing our field. The 2019 Tokyo Research fair will focus on *building research capability*.
